

We are so proud of our robust training department, led by **Clinical Training Coordinator** Kristin Michaels, MFT (right, pictured with Admin Assistant Gaby Plaza).

Our trainings are developed to help mental health providers, social service professionals, and resource families obtain the latest information on topics relevant to recognizing resilience while also supporting vulnerable children, youth and families impacted by trauma. In conjunction with



Chabot-Las Positas Community College District and Alameda County Social Services Agency through Title IV-E Funding, we provided trainings to staff from 77 other agencies throughout Alameda County, including six departments within Alameda County Behavioral Health Care and three departments within Alameda County Public Health Care. That's up from 25 agencies served in FY 17-18. In FY 2018-19, we had 776 participants in 64 trainings with a total of 224 training hours.

That's just one way we work toward our vision of a safe home for every child.
